#### **OPEN HEARTS**

Unfortunately, families in our school communities have gone through some tremendous tragedy, loss, and hardship this past month. The support from our schools and broader communities for those affected by the vehicular accident and the house fire have been remarkable. Important reminders to be grateful for what we have and kind to those around us.

As we get near Spring Break, please find the time to connect and care for each other. Let's not take tomorrow, or others for granted.

#### **SD 27 LEARNING SERIES**

It was great to see the robust engagement from teachers in the February Pro-D offerings. I grade the opportunity to take in the multi-grade, all day numeracy workshop with Carole Fullerton. The energy was fantastic, and it was very exciting to see the expanded interest into secondary. Carole will be back in April for our final Pro-D where she will also work in schools on with teachers on the day before as she did this time at Horse Lake and Mile 108.



#### **SD 27 NUMERACY ASSESSMENT**

We have had a considerable focus on Numeracy for the past two years and have had staff engaged with renowned experts, Peter Liljedahl and Carole Fullerton. As classroom instructional practices continue to shift, we are also discussing ongoing assessment practices that reflect good classroom instruction. Recently, Principals Holly Zurak and Sari Small, along with Director Cameron, facilitated an SD 'think tank' on numeracy assessment (k-9) as part of Ms. Fullerton's last visit. The group included elementary and secondary teachers from across the district as we begin the process towards implementing a numeracy assessment that also informs instruction.

#### **NORTHERN INTERIOR BRANCH MEETINGS**

Trustees from across the North Central and East gathered in Prince George January 20-21 to discuss key issues in education with a specific focus on our region. Of critical importance for the



region and sector has been recruitment and retention. The Chapter (and NW) has partnered with Ministry on a pilot project to recruit for the hardest to fill areas. They are starting with Nisga'a, North and South Peace, SD 82 (Hazeltons) and SD91 (Ft. St James). Despite our struggles, we have done remarkably well. Boards also were able to spend some time with Mike McKay (formerly SD27 special advisor) as he discussed the importance of good governance and the perils of it done poorly.

### **MINISTRY PARTNER LIAISON MEETINGS**

Chair Patenaude and Superintendent van der Mark joined trustees, Superintendents, Secretary Treasurers and Ministry to connect and focus on key issues. Key areas include the new reporting policy and the Indigenous graduation requirements. We continue to look more critically and deeper at specific indigenous indicators and despite significant improvements, we have a long way to go. Following the COVID years, it has been nice to be part of conversations that bring learning back to the forefront of the conversation in BC.

#### STAFFING, RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION

We have submitted our projections for the coming year and are expecting fairly status quo enrolment. HR has continued to interview and hire for teaching and support staff positions. They are conducting 3-4 teacher interviews per week and are hitting career fairs across the country. Big thanks to the CCTA and its members for helping advertise and endorse the district and learning opportunities. This has been an all-around team effort!

#### SAFER SCHOOLS PRESENTATION ON SOCIAL MEDIA AWARENESS

On February 21, SD27 schools facilitated digital awareness sessions for students, staff, and parents. Schools organized grades group sessions and according to Ms. Darney, feedback from students was instant as there was A LOT of learning in these sessions. Look for these sessions to continue in the future.

#### Northern Interior Branch meeting Jan 20/21 Pr George

This year's MLA forum was attended by

- Dan Davies MP Peace River North, Mike Morris MLA Pr George – Mackenzie, Coralee Oakes MLA Cariboo North, John Rustad MLA Nechako Lakes

We are the only BC Branch that hosts this forum every year.

Recruitment and retention of teaching and support staff was foremost in the talks and questions. There are 150 Letters of Permission within the Northern Interior Branch (8 districts with SD27 the most southern to the Yukon/BC border in the north). We were presented by Stephen Petrucci – Superintendent SD60 an overview of the Northern Districts Recruitment and Retention Inquiry Project. This inquiry is being undertaken in 4 northern districts – SD92 Nisga'a, SD7 Stikine, SD82 Coast Mountains and SD91 Nechako Lakes - by the Ministry of Education and Child Care, BC School Superintendent Association Northern Chapter, and the Public-School Employers Association. This working group will explore recruitment and retention strategies specifically for rural and remote areas of the province. As this work unfolds, they will report back on promising practices for further discussion.

An extraordinary motion was passed to change the length of term for the NIB executive from one to two-vear terms.

#### **BCPSEA AGM Jan 26/27 Vancouver**

The Business Session covered

- Report of the 21-22 audited financial statements
- Presentation of the 23-24 budget
- Appointment of auditors
- Support staff and teacher bargaining updates contracts have been accepted
- Recruitment trends and challenges
- Conflict of interest case law updates

An overview was presented on a completed pilot program entitled **Seamless Day** which has expanded to another 21 schools. "This program gives children continuity throughout the day on their learning journey. Access to quality, inclusive care and early learning is critical in supporting parents, particularly mothers, to pursue career or education goals while being confident that their kids are being cared for."

The Seamless Day Kindergarten pilot program will employ certified early childhood educators to provide before- and after-school care in kindergarten classrooms and to support learning alongside the classroom teacher. The program makes use of existing classrooms outside of school hours and does not require new rooms or buildings.

We also received an update on the **JustB4** pilot program. The Province is investing \$125,000 to expand the JustB4 early childhood education program, which is specifically designed to support children the year before they enter kindergarten. JustB4 is a half-day licensed pre-school childcare program for three- to four-year-olds.

JustB4 operates in conjunction with existing StrongStart BC (SSBC) program by using available SSBC spaces in schools. This partnership maximizes the use of SSBC staff, space, and resources within schools. In most cases, early childhood educators from SSBC also teach in JustB4. SSBC programs are taught in the mornings. The same staff teach JustB4 in the afternoons.

This is the second year I am virtually attending Gangs and Guns presented by Safer Schools together symposium. The work being done by the combined efforts of RCMP, Corrections, Social Workers, Indigenous Communities, American Police Agencies is dedicated and thoughtful. It is in response to the rising and constantly changing landscapes of gang activity in North America. This year's symposium was held in Burnaby BC (I attended virtually):

- Children as young as 12 are being recruited to gang work in BC
- Instagram is one of the main platforms used to recruit
- Music and Music Videos portray gang life as exciting and affluent
- BC is a middle-class gang environment where people of any age or demographic background are being recruited successfully. The first keynote speaker in the conference stated if he looked at a gymnasium of 1000 students, any one of those students could be a gang member and most are motivated by easy money.

The presenter shared examples from other jurisdictions, including the Sandy Hook incident and reflected on key learnings.

#### **Guns and Human Trafficking**

Firearms are changing for illegal use in Canada with the new legislations and laws around Restricted Firearms (People cannot buy, sell, or transfer handguns within Canada, and they cannot bring newly acquired handguns into the country. A national handgun freeze was first announced alongside Bill C-21, the strongest gun control measures in over 40 years, in May 2022), shifting towards use of unrestricted firearms (rifles) in criminal acts. Obtaining these firearms include stealing from homes, businesses and advanced reproduction or home-made devices.

The average age of victims in human trafficking is 11 to 14 years old.

Human Trafficking is more than labour trafficking or sex trafficking, it is also causing young men to perform beatings on behalf of traffickers under duress.

Sex trafficking targets group homes specifically young women identified as at risk for sex exploitation and were being recruited directly into high level sex trade from the group home by Traffickers.

### Mary's Take Aways

- What is a trustees' role in case of crisis in our schools (wildfire, shooting etc.)?
- Local school field trip destinations and their staff; like Scout Island, Gavin Lake, Museum
  may need to be consider training related to the ability to plan and keep our children safe

I attended the Northern Interior Branch meeting January 20-21/2023. At the meeting we received updates from the various committees under the BC School Trustee Association. Carolyn Brody the president of the BCSTA attended from the lower mainland.

We had presentation from BCSTA IEC (Indigenous Education Committee). It was a good opportunity to hear what is happening in other districts as well as lots of questions and comments for the IEC.

A survey on Indigenous Education will be sent out in the next month. Trustees are encouraged to share the survey and participate in the feedback.

We as a group talked about sharing outwards more of the positive shifts and changes that are happening in our schools as we don't seem to do a great job as a collective.

Several MLAs were in attendance allowing for items such as AFG funding, recruitment and retention (BCSPEA has a pilot project started in the north involving a few districts, we look forward to an update in April on the project), budget inflation and intercommunity travel access issues to be discussed.

The above topics were used as points for motion creation. Trustee Forbes and I both submitted rough motions for consideration.
